Forest Festival Returns Aug. 20 to Barton Flats

Mark your calendar for Saturday, Aug. 20, when SGWA's annual Forest Festival returns to the Barton Flats Visitor Center.

This event is a celebration of wilderness and the forest in general, with exhibitors and activities that help visitors discover the variety of plants and animals in these mountains, recreational activities available to them, and how to respect and care for this resource.

It's the beginning of summer and we're on a roll. Many volunteers are out on the trails, working at visitor centers at Mill Creek and Barton Flats, and keeping visitors safe at Big Falls.

One of our biggest trail crews ever – 22 people, including many new volunteers – cleared the Aspen Grove Trail to the Fish Creek Trail junction of 32 trees in one day! That has to be a record! The rock bar team on that project even earned itself a nickname; check out the logo created by John Flippin elsewhere in this newsletter.

Two teams of volunteers set up an SGWA booth at regional events in April and June, at The Wildlands Conservancy in Oak Glen and Prado Regional Park. They interacted with nearly 800 people, a great way to let even more people know about what we do and the importance of the wilderness.

One of our own two public outreach events is coming up soon, the Forest Festival on Aug. 20. We'll need plenty of volunteers. Watch for more details, and be sure to sign up on the calendar.

National Forest Week is July 11-17 and the National Forest Foundation is holding a photo contest to celebrate.

Photos may be submitted between July 11 and midnight (MT) July 17. Categories are landscape (no people), recreation, and youth photographer (18 and under).

National Forest Week celebrates the 193million-acre National Forests and Grasslands system and the benefits they provide to the public.

This system includes: more than 9,000 miles of scenic byways.

almost 150,000 miles of hiking trails, more than 4,400 miles of wild and scenic rivers, at least 5,100 campgrounds, and 328 natural pools. National Forests

and Grasslands,



which are managed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture-Forest Service host more than 170 million visits each year. Visitor spending pumps \$13.5 billion into the economy annually, sustaining nearly 223,000 jobs in gateway communities.

"These lands are the foundation of America's outdoor recreation heritage and sustain our way of life.

"They provide water to millions Americans in thousands of communities, clean our air, store carbon, and provide timber, minerals, oil and gas and other resources for industry and communities," according to a statement on the National Forest Foundation's website.

The foundation is chartered by Congress and promotes forest conservation and responsible recreation.

Volunteer Profile

Nelva Valladares

The first time Nelva Valladares hiked in the San Gorgonio Wilderness 10 years ago the route she chose quickly became a favorite: a "lollipop loop" from South Fork Trail to Dry Lake, up the Sky High Trail to the San Gorgonio summit, then down to Dollar Lake and the South Fork Trail.

"Each time it teaches me a valuable lesson and creates beautiful memories with friends," she said.

Nelva began volunteering with SGWA in 2021 "and my goal is to make it over 26 years and more." She became a volunteer, she said, "to help protect the San Gorgonio Wilderness so that one day my future children and their children can enjoy this wilderness just like I do and be part of this wonderful organization."

"SGWA is important because its volunteers protect, nurture and care for the wilderness, and create a space for others with the same goal to come together and carry this on for future generations," she explained.

Nelva's skills, commitment, and enthusiasm on trail maintenance crews last year earned her a spot as a trail boss this season and election to the Board of Directors in March.

This summer she also hopes to do day and overnight patrols, where her experience helping to manage a family-owned restaurant – ensuring that customers have a positive experience and overseeing employees – will be a plus interacting with hikers on the trail.

Whether it's sawing huge trees blocking trails or hauling rocks and dirt to shore up eroding trails, Nelva said she has been impressed by the skill of fellow volunteers and their commitment to safety.

"Every time we are out on trail projects SAFETY is our main priority, from wearing the proper safety gear to carrying tools the right way and communicating when we are rolling rocks and logs," she said. "Everyone is so friendly and willing to teach and help one another.

"I've learned so much in one year with SGWA. Everyone has been a mentor to me. Now I can teach other new volunteers."
