Volunteers Wrap Up a Successful Season

SGWA celebrated the end of another successful season at the annual awards potluck on Oct. 9, a season that was a welcome change from 2020 when the El Dorado and Apple fires closed the San Gorgonio Wilderness for two months and Covid safety protocols limited volunteer activities until this spring.

Our volunteers donated more than

11,300 hours during the 2021 season, a contribution which the U.S. Forest Service calculates is equivalent to nearly \$323,000. Approximately 120 volunteers contributed hours in and around the San Gorgonio and Cucamonga Wilderness areas, working to protect and clean the forest, improve facilities and trails, and help about 18,000 visitors appreciate and enjoy the forest.

The online wilderness permit system we developed this year is popular with hikers for the ease and speed of obtaining day and overnight permits. More than 6,900 permits were issued between June 1, when the system went live, and Sept. 1, when the forest was closed. The new system allows SGWA to provide updates about information important to hikers such as water availability and bear activity, and enables immediate safety warnings such as the September closure of national forests in California due to extreme fire danger.

Trail crews tackled a variety of projects in the San Gorgonio and Cucamonga Wilderness areas. They cleared 431 trees and repaired 36,905 feet of tread, which included removing brush and shoring up trails by hauling tons of rock by hand to build rock walls.

Patrol volunteers monitored water availability in the back country, advised backpackers about the need for permits, dismantled 106 illegal fire rings, and picked up more than 150 bags of trash.

Interpretive programs educated more than 9,900 visitors about fire safety, Leave No Trace ethics, and how to appreciate and share the forest with the plants and animals that live there. The Barton Flats Visitor Center served nearly 1,500 people; volunteers at the Big Falls Recreation Area talked to more than 6,800 visitors; and front desk staff at the Mill Creek Ranger Station assisted nearly 1,000 visitors. Several volunteers participated in surveying Heritage Sites, confirming and identifying artifacts for the Forest Service.

Every Saturday evening during the summer, campers in the Barton Flats area gathered in the Greyback Amphitheater to hear SGWA volunteers share their passion for the forest and explain what everyone can do to help protect it. Ranger Talks drew more than 680 people in 2021.

In August the Forest Festival drew more than 300 people to the Barton Flats Visitor Center to learn

about the forest, the wilderness and SGWA activities. Among the popular activities, as always, were sawing tree cookies and panning for gold, as well as admiring a great horned owl from the Big Bear Alpine Zoo and making nature crafts.

The 300+ Club

These volunteers each donated more than 300 hours of service during the 2021 season.

Mike Bigness topped the list of volunteers in terms of hours donated with nearly 900 hours! Mike is well-known at Big Falls Recreation Area, where he keeps order in the parking lot and explains to visitors why it's dangerous to climb the falls.

Part of the success of SGWA's trail maintenance program is due to **David Bratt**, who donated more than 710 hours. He is an active trail boss and trail surveyor, and sits on the SGWA Board of Directors.

John Howell is an all-season patrol volunteer who donated more than 620 hours, spending most of his time at Dry Lake. Hikers appreciated his up-to-date information about water sources and bear activity.

Bob Williams contributed more than 530 hours and is SGWA's volunteer coordinator, scheduling trail patrols and sending weekly reports to the Forest Service. He also serves on the Board of Directors and works on trail projects.

President **Bettye Miller** donated more than 450 hours in 2021. She volunteers at the Barton Flats Visitor Center, writes grant proposals, is editor of the quarterly newsletter and yearbook, and co-chaired the Forest Festival this year.

Roxanne Smith manages volunteer staffing at the Mill Creek Visitor Center Front Desk. She donated more than 415 hours this season, assisting visitors and serving on the SGWA Board of Directors.

When SGWA was asked in May to resume Ranger Talks at the Greyback Amphitheater **Jean Rogers** stepped up to manage the program. She also volunteered at the Barton Flats Visitor Center, donating more than 360 hours.

Dan Scott contributed more than 335 hours patrolling trails in the San Gorgonio Wilderness, particularly at Dry Lake. He also programmed new radios for SGWA.

Eileen Hay, SGWA's trails coordinator, donated more than 300 hours this year. She organized trail maintenance projects and led trail crews in an especially productive season. She also serves on the SGWA Board of Directors.

Congratulations on another successful season! It felt good to get back to almost-normal.

The year was full of highlights we can all be proud of. Trails coordinator Eileen Hay and her team of trail bosses introduced a new training program for trail crews that was highly successful, both in skills taught and in the retention of new volunteers.

Nearly a third of first-time volunteers put in more than 100 hours each this season, a first for SGWA. Our trail crews were especially productive, removing more than 430 trees from trails and clearing or repairing nearly 7 miles of tread.

Patrol and interpretive volunteers continued the important work of keeping the hiking public safe and providing vital information about trail conditions and Leave No Trace principles, all in the hope that others will become good stewards of the wilderness we love.

Executive Directors Val Silva led the development of an online permit system for the San Gorgonio Wilderness that is so successful that the Forest Service asked us to include the Cucamonga Wilderness as well. This system has been well-received by hikers, and it's free, unlike online wilderness permit systems elsewhere in the country. We are trailblazers in the digital and the natural world.

Because of you SGWA remains the model for wilderness preservation organizations in the country.
